CURRENT / WORK IN PROGRESS

My new book of short stories, titled *Little Red Transistor Radio from Trieste* was published in October 2012 in the UK. One of stories, titled *Small Red Radio From Trieste* has been published in Under the Radar literary magazine [2011].

I am currently working on two novels.

One, set in Germany and Serbia, is dealing with betrayal and loss. Another, set in Patagonia, is about the imaginary worlds.

Parallel to my work on fiction, I am gathering material for a major study on the space between the languages and how does it affect creative and cognitive practices of exiles. I envision this as a potential source of income for the University, both through grants and cooperation with interested institutions.

CONCEPTUAL ART

1993 After witnessing misappropriation of some of my articles during the war in Bosnia, I decided to symbolically withdraw my words from public life in Serbia. For this purpose I wrote and hand-printed a single copy of *A* Shadow & *a Dream*, a poetry book, which I circulated from hand to hand, thus putting my words under strict control.

Exhibition Trivia: Art & War, at the Gallery of Belgrade Cultural Centre (Catalogue intro: Prof. Milena Dragićević Šešić). After collecting for several years the artefacts which the street vendors in Serbia sold during the war years, I exhibited them in one place, hoping that such concentration would clearly show what I suspected: that this bric-a-brac was actually a hidden call to arms. It worked: on the day of opening a paramilitary threatened to activate a hand grenade in the gallery and he destroyed several items. The exhibition still went on.

	This music magazine had circulation of about 17,000 when I took it over. (I was removed from this position for political reasons, after publishing a satire against Slobodan Milosevic. The whole team of editors and writers resigned in protest and its publisher closed the magazine permanently.)

	After two-years break for serving the Army, I moved to Belgrade to work with this publication, which, in the post-Tito years of dying communism, was known for its frequent clashes with the system and was a refuge of dissidents. I commissioned articles from a wide spectrum of artists and writers, started a publishing company and a record company within the magazine, took part in redesigning it, and formed a tight intellectual circle around it. I also initiated and produced cultural exchange between Serbian and Croatian artists (rock concerts, exhibitions, public readings).

	My first poem was published in 1974 and my first article in 1975. After becoming a regular contributor for this magazine, I was signed as their youngest editor in charge of the Arts. I worked as an editor during my studies.
